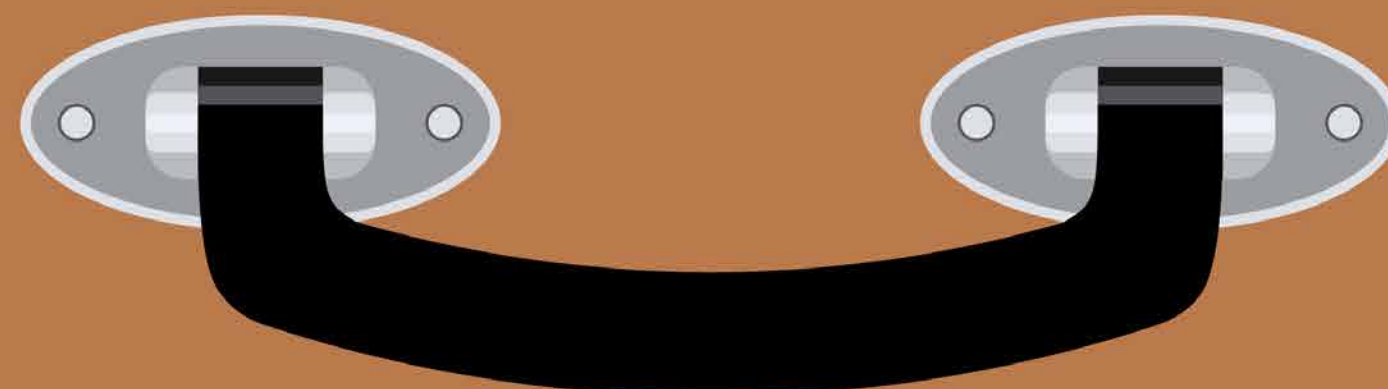

To prepare some expanded noun phrases to use in a diary entry

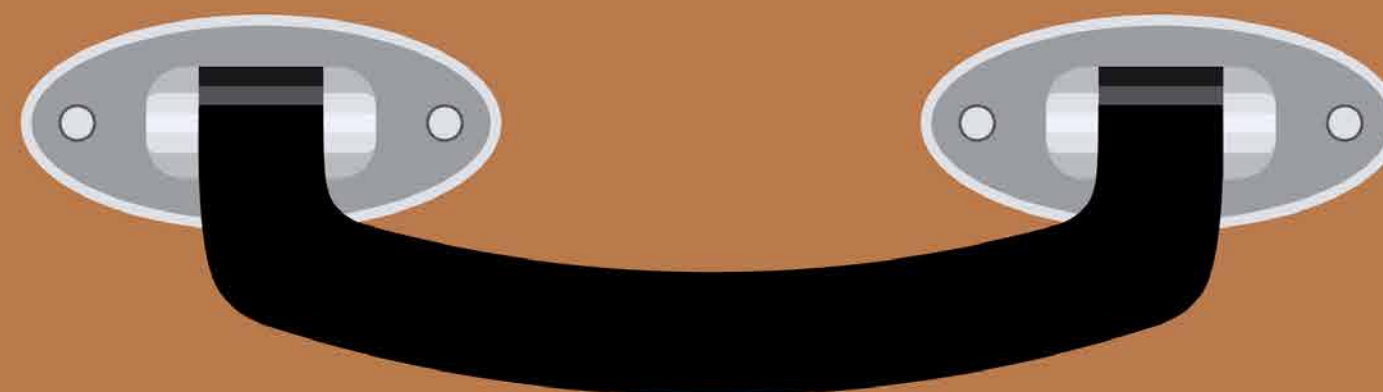

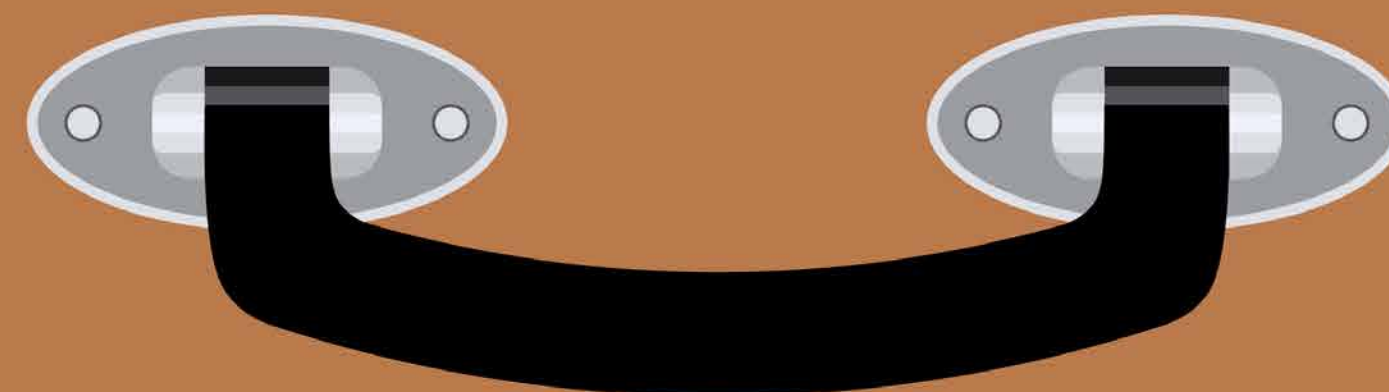
You have been writing noun phrases. These are groups of words centred around the noun. Usually it is a noun with accompanying adjectives.

The scruffy boy

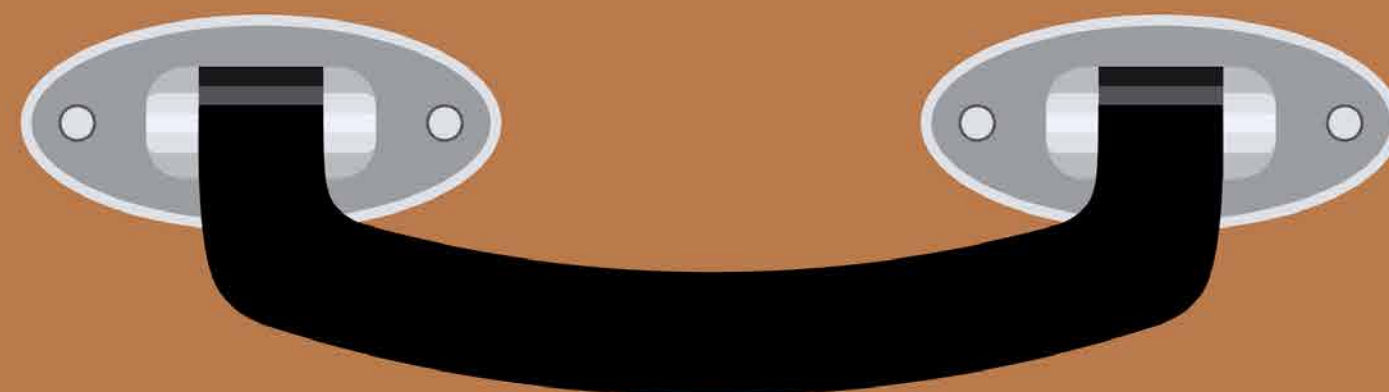

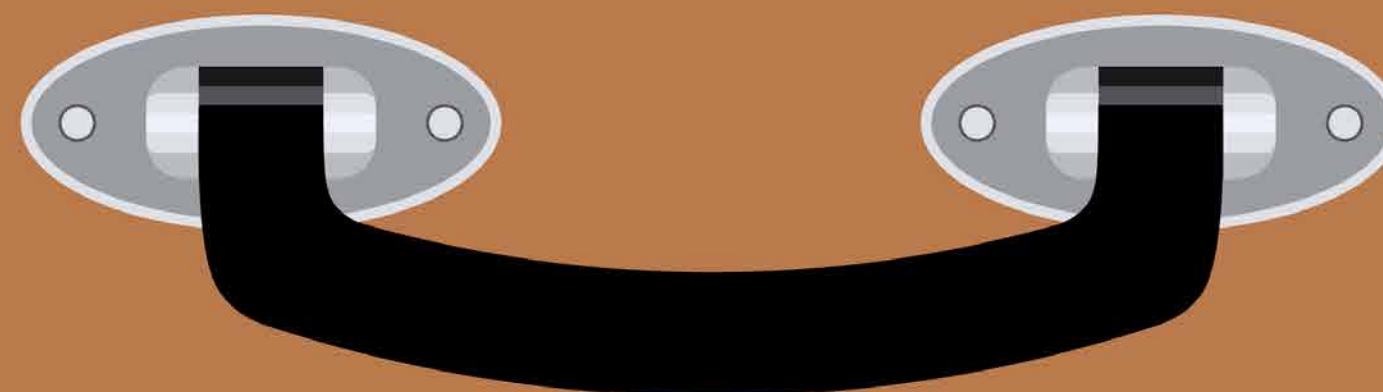

This phrase could be describing many different children in the picture. We need more detail if we want to be specific.



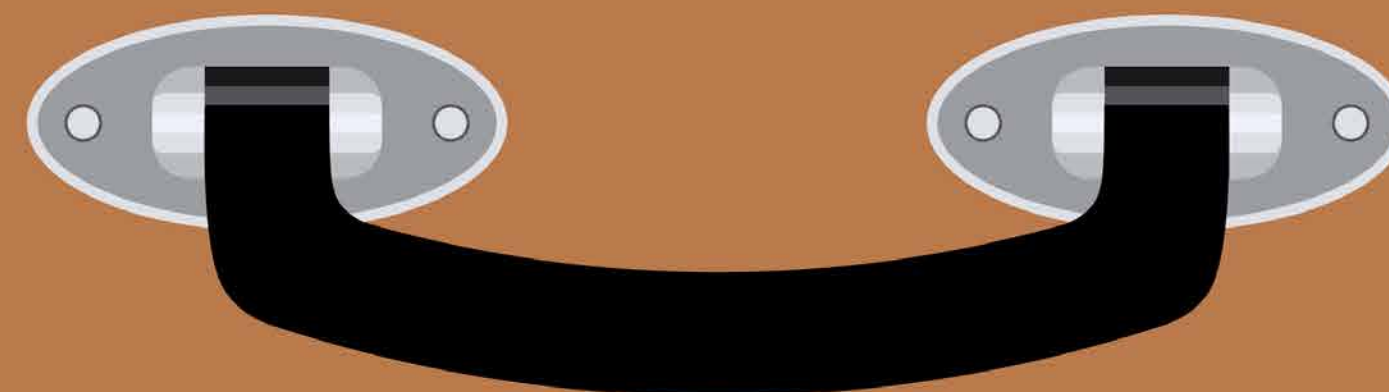

A preposition tells us more about a noun's relationship to other words in the sentence. It can add detail about **where** something is or **when** something is happening.



Prepositional phrases can start with many different prepositions such as with, on, of, in, above, behind, at or from.
