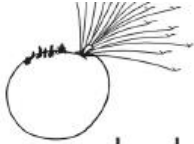
INVENTING ROOM



"This is the most important room in the entire factory!" he said. "All my most secret new inventions are cooking and simmering in here!"

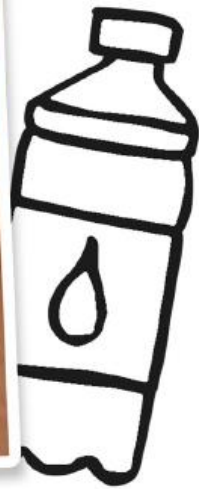

What makes them interesting?



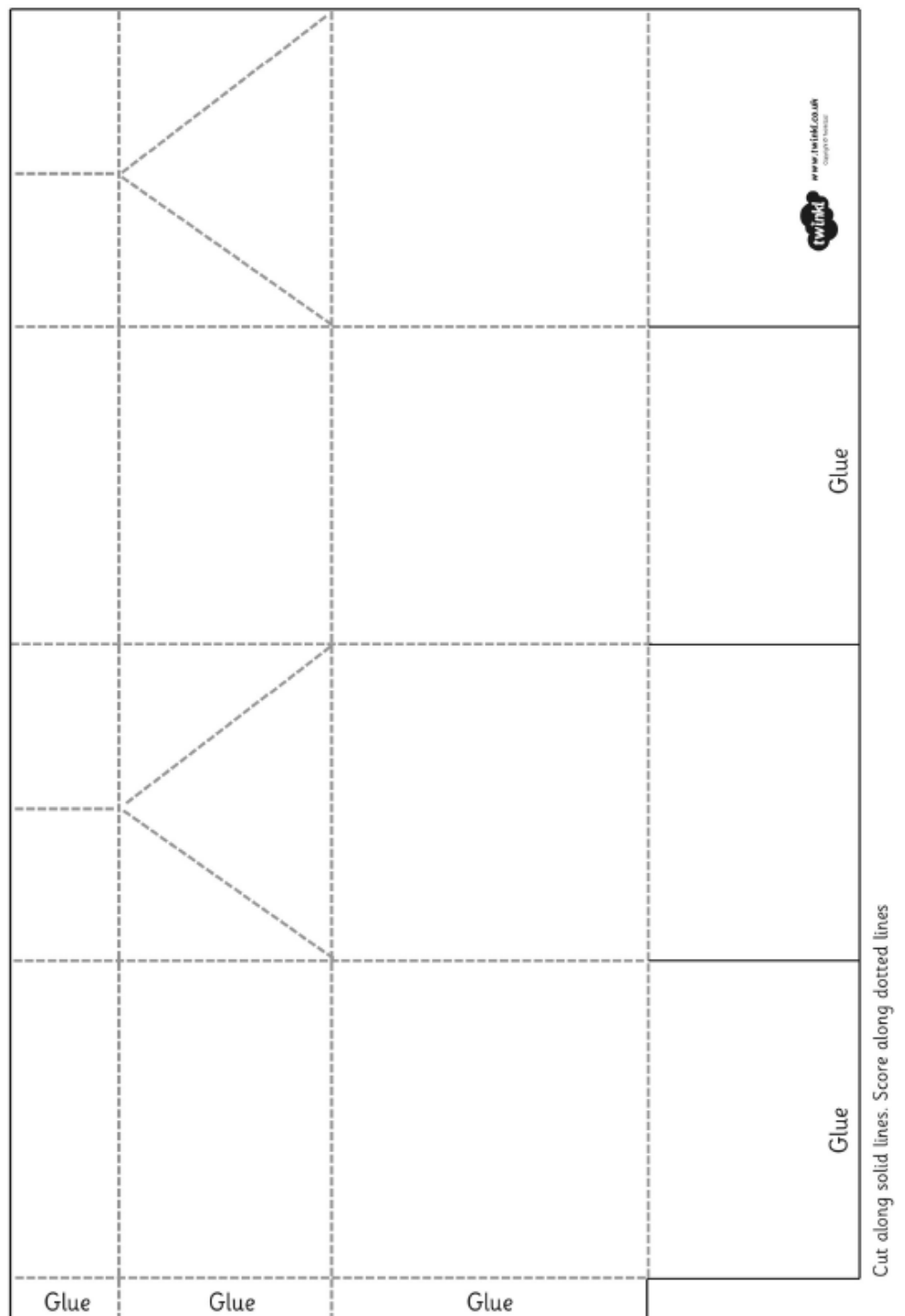
- Include Dahl-ian vocabulary, e.g. armadillo's toes and snozzwanger!

Dream catchers



You will need: scissors hole puncher coloured pens ribbon
paper plate beads feathers stickers glitter

Begin by cutting out a circle from the centre of your paper plate. Take a hole punch and cut even holes into the edge of your paper plate dream catcher. Cut a long strip of ribbon and knot it to one hole and then lace it through to the hole opposite. Pull the ribbon through, then lace through another hole opposite, continue this until all the holes have been threaded. Cut 4 more pieces of different sized ribbon and thread these through the bottom 4 holes of your dream catcher, tie each piece at the back, so that the ribbon hangs down. Thread on some beads and add some little knots under the beads to keep them in place. Attach feathers using glue or tape to the bottom part of your paper plate dream catcher.

You will need: an empty jar - food colouring with a little water or paint (2 or 3 colours) - cotton wool - glitter

Place a large layer of cotton wool into your jar. Pour in your first colour using either food colouring and water or paint, making sure the wool is covered. Add some glitter, sprinkling it right to the edges of the jar. Repeat the process by adding another layer of cotton wool and a different colour paint and glitter twice more, so you have 3 layers. Screw on your lid and your dream jar is complete.



A Novel Idea

Quentin Blake is an artist and writer, who is perhaps best known for illustrating Roald Dahl's stories and poems. His drawings are easy to recognise and very funny to look at. Your copy of *James and the Giant Peach* may well have been illustrated by Quentin Blake! Have a look and see...

In 2007, Quentin Blake was asked to design a huge 16-metre-high mural on fabric to 'wrap' an empty building opposite St. Pancras railway station in London. Passengers arriving at the newly opened station are now greeted by a range of comical characters, eating and drinking, dancing and singing.



Your challenge is to design your own mural to cover up a boring looking building!

Your design should be based around the adventures and characters from Roald Dahl books.

Think carefully about which building you would like to 'wrap' and why, as well as how to illustrate your mural interestingly.
